The Secretary of the Boleskine Camanachd told the BB recently that there is doubt that it will be feasible to upgrade the Factory Field at Foyers. At a recent AGM of the Shinty Club it was disclosed that the club was short of both players and people willing to help with organisation. Committed members, who would take charge of organising youth training under the name of Boleskine, were needed. This would require two or three people in Foyers and Stratherrick to commit time on a weekly basis. As there were no representatives from Foyers or Stratherrick present at the AGM and as the Farr members were keen to promote shinty in Strathnairn it was decided that support should be concentrated there. Since the AGM a senior team has been formed so that fixtures can be met. There will be an open meeting in Stratherrick Hall later in the summer to discuss the problem.

No Change for the Roads



The announcement by Mr MacInnes, the Roads and Transport Area Manager for Highland Council, that there was little money available for improvement to our local roads, came as no surprise to the 28 people attending a recent meeting in Stratherrick Hall. The meeting was organised by the community council. Local residents expressed their concerns about scrub clearance on the Dores/Foyers road, road verges, passing places, cattle grids and traffic calming.

Mr MacInnes explained that his budget had been reduced from over 3 million pounds in 1996 to 2 million. Most of this shortfall was due to the loss by Highland Council of the trunk road One community councillor contract. felt that we should be content with the condition of our roads, and that people who had moved into the area should not expect services equivalent to other parts of the country. Despite this, there was a genuine concern amongst those living in Errogie that there was no statutory form of traffic calming in place. However, Mr MacInnes reported that the total budget for traffic calming and similar new projects only amounted to £25,000 for the year - equal to no more than a couple of lav-bys.

Extract from the Draft Local Plan



PROSPECTS

Fovers originated with the establishment of the British Aluminium works 7.7.1 a century ago. Since its closure more than 30 years ago, the village has suffered population and job losses. The economy is dominated by hydro-electricity generation, despite employment at the power station reducing significantly over the years. Although located off the main tourist route, the village attracts summer visitors. An interesting industrial heritage could be interpreted to supplement established local attractions which include the Forest Enterprise Visitor Centre and exceptional woodland walks to the Falls. Facilities for landing small boats have long been a local aspiration. The community continues to support important local facilities with a new medical centre built recently. The priorities are to restore employment, enable local housing needs to be met and draw visitors.

DEVELOPMENT FACTORS

- Foyers is fragmented by steep and heavily afforested ground, a deeply incised gorge and exceptional amenity woodland. The main development opportunities involve:
 - lower, open ground comprising the raised beach either side of the River Foyers;
 - re-use or conversion of derelict or vacant buildings and land.

POLICIES AND PROPOSALS

Housing

The following land is allocated for housing:



The following land is allocated for business use:

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- The Council will encourage upgrading and expansion of visitor accommodation/recreation facilities based on existing establishments
 - Craigdarroch House Hotel: planning permission has been granted for 25 chalets;
 - Foyers Bay Hotel/Foyers Mains, subject to additional passing places and safeguards for the Listed Buildings:
 - conversion/use of the steading and Doocot;
 - provision of caravan and camping facilities;
 - golf in the open fields south west of the mains.

Special Uses

- The Council will encourage development of the BA Works, a Category B Listed Building, for visitor related or other business or residential use. This could provide a focus for a heritage centre/working museum based on the local industrial archaeology together with hostel/bunkhouse-type accommodation, tearoom and toilets or a suitable mix of housing accommodation.
- A new Fire Station is proposed to be built in 2001/02. Various sites are under investigation by the Fire Board.
- 0.2 ha. of land west of the River Foyers is allocated for a new Waste Water Treatment Plant which NOSWA propose to construct in 2005.
- 0.5 ha, of land adjoining the cemetery is allocated for extension of that facility.
- 0.2 ha. of land is allocated for relocation of the playing field pavilion.
- The Council will encourage re-use of the Outreach Centre for community purposes. Alternatively, assembled with the adjoining sheds, this site could be redeveloped, possibly for sheltered housing.

- The Council will encourage provision of "gateway" signposting of Foyers at the main village entrance points on the 8862.

5.9 STRATHERRICK

PROSPECTS

The main settlements - Gorthleck and Errogie - straddle the B862, facing south over Loch Mhor towards the Monadliath. These are remote communities, dependant on mobile or community transport services. Opportunities to diversify the upland farming and local crofting base could arise with promotion of the scenic route and recreational access to land. Local needs and specialist housing is earmarked a priority by the Small Communities Housing Trust.

DEVELOPMENT FACTORS

- 7.9.2 The following principles should be adhered to:
 - shape: retaining the linear form of the settlements primarily west of the 8862:
 - separation: maintaining the open land between Errogie and Gorthleck;
 - safety: introducing traffic and pedestrian measures throughout the villages;
 - facilities: addressing the need for local housing and other amenities.







Houses at Gorthleck?

Mr Di Alexander of the Small Communities' Housing Trust told the BB recently that he regrets the uncertainty surrounding the development of the ground in Gorthleck. The land has been secured but it is now subject to the resumption of crofting title. This has been delayed because the Crofters Commission could not have access to the ground when the Foot and Mouth restrictions were in force. Mr Alexander will be meeting NOSWA on the 11th

July to resolve the problem of sewage. NOSWA have been unclear as to what they require in the way of sewage treatment for the site. It is hoped that the problems will be resolved over the summer.

Foot and Mouth

In Scotland the government has taken a strong lead in opening up the hills, realising how important such access is to the rural economy. Local authorities have been issued with new guidance that stipulates that land can only be closed if the landowner or farmer has provided a risk assessment which shows, to the satisfaction of both the Local Authority and the Divisional Veterinary Manager, that there is a potential disease risk which cannot reasonably be avoided.

Muck and Magic continues...

Following an illuminating discussion composting, organised by the Boleskine Environmental Network in May, twentyeight compost bins have now arrived in the These are being distributed to composting enthusiasts locally. This year a total of 3000 bins are being made available throughout the Highlands by the Council. This will be the biggest ever trial of composting in the region and gives us the chance to show that we are committed to taking care of our environment and reducing the damage caused by landfills. These bins normally retail at £39 but Highland Council is letting us have them for £5! But there is a catch... in return they need to know if composting works.

So, with each bin distributed locally there will be brief guidelines on making good compost and using it afterwards, and a small monitoring sheet (recording type and quantity of waste diverted from wheelie bin to compost



heap) that requires to be filled out three times a year. Not too much work for a bargain!

B.E.N. has been successful in contributing to the ten year design plans which Forest Enterprise have now submitted to the planning department. It was the first time that people living in the area have been able to say how they would want their woods and forests to look like in the future. The clearing of conifers from burn sides, allowing natural regeneration of native species trees and maintaining view points are just some of the ideas now incorporated into the plans. Many of our forests are being restructured to rebalance the intensive planting of conifers which took place in Scotland after the 2nd World War. Copies of the plans are soon to be on permanent display in the hall at Gorthleck. Further comments will be welcome.

A BOTTLE BANK FOR FOYERS?

The environmental group has been asked by our local councillor Ella MacRae and by the Community Council to find a site for a bottle bank in Foyers. Now that one has been installed in Gorthleck funding has been found by Highland Council to locate one in Foyers. A site needs to be found. 
RED CROSS


