Flu Vaccination

Flu vaccination time is approaching yet again. The virus that causes influenza can change and yearly vaccination is required to improve immunity against the most likely strain of the virus that is expected to cause flu each winter.

Anyone over 65 is recommended to have the vaccine and anyone younger with a chronic illness, such as asthma or heart disease, (and now also liver disease) is also recommended to have the vaccine. There also has been recent advice that anyone who is the main carer for an elderly or disabled person should also receive the flu vaccine.

Normally the vaccine is available in the first week of October but a recent circular states that there could be a two-week delay in delivery due to the WHO providing vaccine strains late to the manufacturers. We will put up posters when the vaccine is available.

Minute of Meeting 24 May

Correspondence: RES - letter in relation to CC objection to proposed Dunmaglass wind farm, noting their regret at objection but wishing to continue dialogue. HOL - copy of letter sent to RES regarding community benefit. Loch Ness Partnership - information leaflets about the Loch Ness area.

Treasurer: Copy of annual accounts were distributed for comments. Ord. acc. £59.20; project acc. £3201.25. The BB wish the CC contribution to increase from £225.00 to £250.00. This covers the cost of printing the minutes. It was agreed that it was important for the community to have access to the minutes and that the BB was the best way of distributing them, therefore the increase was agreed to. The outgoings from the CC accounts must be looked at as it is currently running at a deficit (money is being used from the project account). Therefore the giving of donations must be reviewed or fundraising must be done.

Roads and Road Signs: Miss A Rose enquired who was responsible for upkeep of the Vennel road as it is deteriorating. It was agreed that it was not the Roads Dept, but probably owned by Corriegarth, Donald Forbes and the Forestry Commission. There are minor landslides in wet weather on the Foyers road, just past the school, causing stones to be on the road. The work at Torness bridge has not been completed after the work carried out by BT. The secretary will notify the roads dept of the above points.

Water and Sewerage: Work has started in Foyers and a new site for the sewerage works is being looked at. **Community Project:** It is was agreed that the project group needs to be a separate entity from the CC and have a separate bank account. The CED grant is available until the 31 July 2005.

Renewable Energy and Community Benefit: At a meeting with Mr Owen of HOL and the sub group, it was agreed that a lump sum of £22,000 should be paid directly into the bank account of Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust in respect of the Garrogie hydro scheme, rather than take an annual payment of £2000. It was expected that there would be a similar amount from the River E project. The trustees need to be appointed before money can be distributed. It was agreed to give the process of appointing trustees some thought and it would be discussed more fully at the June meeting.

Minute of Meeting 28 June

Correspondence: University of Aberdeen - questionnaire about the Out of Hours service provided by NHS24. Heart and Stroke Matters – newsletter. Canon - the price of a photocopy has increased to 1p. National Trust - Culloden Battlefield will be redeveloped and finished by April 2007.

Treasurer: Ord. acc. £59.20; project acc. £3201.25. The Highland Council grant of £914.67 was received (not yet banked). Knockie Trust has given £150.00, as requested, to cover the solicitors fees for the lease.

Policing: Mr JW Campbell and Mr Allen attended a meeting regarding Neighbourhood Watch. Although very interesting, a lot was not applicable to this area. Essentially, if someone sees anything suspicious, they should contact a Neighbourhood Watch representative and/or the police. The representatives are Mr Campbell for Gorthleck, and Mr Allen for Whitebridge. Representatives are required for other areas, especially Foyers and Errogie. An article will be put in the BB. Fly tipping is still a problem - contact PC Rimmer at Foyers if there is any information.

Fire Brigade: The local brigade is now retained status. The tender is temporarily at Aberchalder but the planning for the container at the Vennel has been submitted. The group is concerned with community fire safety and will be carrying out a leaflet drop to local residents. If people require information, advice or a home visit Sub Officer Neil Kirkland should be contacted on 486 615 or 486 283. A representative will attend each CC meeting. Smoke detectors are available and can be fitted. Recruits are still required and they must be over 18, fit and healthy, able to attend training and call outs, and ideally should live within 5 minutes of the station.

Roads and Road Signs: Areas of concern to be highlighted to the HC roads dept: the first cattle grid on the Ardachy road (continued from previous page)

and the sign is still in the ditch; the cattle grid on the B862 at Torness/Bochruben requires attention; bushes and trees at the sides of the road require cutting back; the drains at Lalandia, Highfield have been dug but with the wrong gradient so that the water does not drain away and dirt has been left on the roadside, so narrowing the road (ideally a pipe should be put in and the ditch filled with aggregate); 'Children playing' signs are required in Gorthleck to warn drivers of the local children and those using the Hall i.e. toddlers group; 'Concealed entrance' or warning sign required at the Inverness end of Errogie where a school bus stops to pick up children (it was almost hit by a car coming around the bend); Errogie corner needs to be recambered; clarification of who owns the road to Killen Lodge as it badly needs attention.

Water and Sewerage: Work has started at Gorthleck

Renewable Energy and Community Benefit: Mr Campbell will speak to a member of Strathnairn CC to find out how they went about electing trustees. A meeting will be held on Tuesday 26 July for the CC to decide upon the constitution and the election of trustees.

AOB: Drumtemple Cemetery - the gate will not open, the fence is damaged and rubbish has been dumped. The secretary will inform TEC services.

STRATHERRICK AND FOYERS COMMUNITY TRUST LTD

The above company has been set up to manage, invest and disperse community benefit funds from renewable energy companies with projects in our community council area.

In order to set the company up a director and secretary were required, Mr J W Campbell and Mrs F Kirkland were nominated to stand initially.

Highland Opportunity Ltd (HOL) have taken on the role of negotiators with the energy companies on our behalf. The first project to come on line was the River Fechlin hydro project at Garrogie. HOL negotiated a lump sum of £22,000 from RWE Npower and this has been deposited in the Community Trust account. A similar sum is expected from the River E project.

It is now time to make the Trust a community undertaking and for it to become independent of the Community Council. It has been agreed that there should be 7 members of the company, to be responsible for the management of the funds. Two of the places will be representatives from the CC, the other 5 from the

community.

A set of criteria for membership was determined at a special meeting of the CC on July 26th 2005. They are as follows; Members shall;

- have no criminal record
- have been full time resident in the community council catchment area for a minimum of 8 years
- have keen interest in the benefit and welfare of the community
- be at least 18 years of age
- serve for a maximum period of 3 years , at which time there will be elections of the new members
- attend at least 80% of the meetings or forfeit the position

There will be an informal information sharing evening – the date will be announced shortly.

Nomination and application forms will be distributed with the December issue of the Boleskine Bulletin. The list of nominees will be published in the March/April edition along with voting forms.

STRATHERRICK ENVIRONMENTAL ENHANCEMENT PROJECT

A sub group of the Community Council have taken on a project to provide Gorthleck with an 'amenity area' that will be used by both locals and visitors to Stratherrick.


The area opposite the hall has been leased for 19 years. It has now been fenced and drainage put in at the bottom of the site. The borders will be defined by hedgerows to provide a natural habitat for birds and insects. It will be partially landscaped and there will be two three-sided wooden viewing shelters built to promote the enjoyment of the area. There will be an interpretation board detailing the birds that may be seen.

The long-term plan will be to make the site multi-functional. There are no parking places between Fort-Augustus and Dores on the B852 for visitors, so picnic tables will be placed to encourage visitors to linger in the area longer. A clear area will be left that can be used for ball games or for local fun-days, sales of work etc which may also use the facilities provided by the hall. It will be accessible to all members of the community, young and old alike, as well as those who are physically less able. In time it is hoped to provide facilities for children also. This would require local fundraising to buy equipment. Funding has been granted for the initial stages of the project from CED and SNH. There have been a number of factors delaying the start of the project and so our getting the community involved.

We now hope that the planting and the building of the shelters will start in the near future. Anyone wishing to get involved in the project would be most welcome. South Loch Ness Heritage Group



The Group continues to attract a lot of interest, with more suggestions for public meetings or projects than there is time to fulfil them, so if you are interested in lending a hand, please get in touch. The next meeting after the publication of this BB will be on December 5th, probably at Dores. The speaker will be Norman Newton, and the topic will be Roads.

The two pictures are from the northern extremity of the BB area. The one on the front page that looks as if it is suffering from a serious printing error serves as an example of what we can do by way of restoring faded and damaged prints. The Heritage Group are anxious to see any of your pictures, in whatever condition, and may well be able to offer you a much enhanced version for your own use, while hopefully you will allow us to add a copy to the archive which we are building up. Even relatively modern colour photographs can suffer badly from fading. Please don't allow a fascinating pictorial record of the area's heritage to languish in a drawer or dusty album.

Anyway, back to these photographs. The group scene is at the fank at Dalcrombie, during clipping in 1899. Some of the individuals are thought to be Johnstones, whose descendants are a stone's throw away at Achnabat today. The incongruous figure on the left is G.F.Watts, the famous English artist, who spent time in this area around the turn of the 20th century. He married Mary Fraser-Tytler of Aldourie in 1866, a more than competent artist in her own right, who established a pottery in Dores in the early 1900's.

The second photograph shows Watts in his portable studio, in this case near Torness. Other photographs show him wrapped in a makeshift midge-net: I can imagine that outdoor painting in the Highlands has always suffered from this problem, and may account for the fact that his Highland landscapes are not amongst his most memorable works! One work which is more highly regarded is 'Death Crowning Innocence', the theme of which was inspired by the tragic death of his wife's 3 year old niece, following a pony-and-

LOCH NESS EXPRESS



125 years ago there were pleasure boat sailings on Loch Ness (see extract from the Inverness Courier).

Now the 'Spirit of Skye' operated by Bill Grant is cruising Loch Ness at 18 knots covering the 30 miles from Dochgarroch to Fort Augustus inside an hour and twenty minutes. It has airline style seating for 27 in the cabin and a further 9 passengers can be accommodated in the open air on the after deck. Passengers making the South to North journey can take a free mini-bus service to the city centre and have three hours to shop and lunch. 'Oldies' who hold a

Highland Travel Pass can make the whole journey for free. There is an arrangement negotiated through Craigdarroch House Hotel that the 'Spirit of Skye' will pick up passengers from Foyers. Phone there to book on 486 400. For more

Glendoe Hydro Scheme

Update on Progress

18th August 2005

Following the granting of consent by Scottish Ministers for the Glendoe Hydro scheme, the decision to proceed with the project was taken by SSE Board on 28th July.

It has been confirmed that Hochtief are the preferred bidder for the contract to construct the scheme and negotiations are continuing towards finalising the construction contract before the end of 2005. The main construction works are scheduled to commence in Spring 2006 with some preparatory works starting in late 2005. The scheme should be generating electricity by the winter of 2008.

Prior to Spring 2006 SSE and Hochtief will be carrying out a large variety of tasks including the refinement of the design and carrying out surveys and producing documentation to satisfy conditions of consent. During this time a planning application will be made for a site camp within a few kilometres of Fort Augustus. The target is for this camp to be ready for occupation by Spring 2006.

Work that may occur on Glendoe Estate prior to Spring 2006 (assuming that all the relevant conditions of consent are satisfied) include ground clearance and preparation works in lower Glendoe Estate, provision of services to site compound and camp areas and some access track construction work.

150 YEARS AGO

- A comfortable-looking "Spirit of the Mountain".

A correspondent of the John O'Groat Journal, who was lately rambling in the neighbourhood of Inverfarigaig, gives the following account of the spirit of Dunjardel:- "When the sun sets down in the far west, the peasantry at times are greatly annoyed, if not terrified, at what seems the wailing and bitter crying of a sorrowing being, emanating from the rugged crags at the foot of Dunjardel, termed in the district Bodach-na-h-eughachd, or crying old man.

Having inquired of honest Donald Grant, the innkeeper, if he himself had ever heard the said Bodach - his reply was, 'Often wi' my own ears.'

This troublesome being appears to have been seen by many, who describe him to be of low stature but very corpulent, which must greatly account for the strength and power of his lungs, as at times he is incessant in his wailings, particularly when there is any of the name of Shaw about taking their

flight to the world of spirits.

In this he is looked upon as a sure harbinger. The surname of Shaw being now not very rife in Stratherrick, likely the Bodach, after crying that ilk out of the land of the living, will cease from disturbing, with his doleful lamentations, the innocent but credulous folks living in the neighbourhood of Dunjardel.

The secret of the singular sound is no doubt to be found in the peculiar formation of some part of the rock, which may be acted on by the wind, or which may echo some distant sounds." (Courier 12.7.1855)

Wildlife Monitoring Group

A small group, under the umbrella of the Boleskine Environmental Network, decided to pursue a wildlife project this year, continuing into next year, involving training by wildlife specialists, followed by monitoring of various species in our local area. Training days on waders, mammals, native flowers, grasses and butterflies have already been held and were very interesting and successful. Another day on fungi is planned for 16th October 2005.

Monitoring of waders is very important due to their recent decline in numbers. Those that attended the meeting with Stuart Benn of the RSPB, spent time over the following month counting the maximum number of each species seen, especially noting how many of those were in definite pairs, how many were single individuals and, from the breeding pairs, how many fledglings were produced. The main species monitored were curlew, oystercatcher, lapwing, snipe and common sandpiper. Results are being sent to the RSPB for their database.

On the mammal day with Ro Scott, signs of badger, pine marten, squirrel, deer and voles were found. In addition, much more was learnt on what to look for and where, for these and many other species. Ro brought with her a comprehensive selection of skulls and skins and covered aspects of mammal law and health and safety issues of mammal surveying. Observations on mammals seen this summer will be sent to the Mammal Society.

Tessa Jones gave us training on both flowers and grasses during 2 days in mid summer — we are all far more knowledgeable now than we were! We had a wonderful day exploring the hidden corners of Jane's (O'Donovan) woodland acres, learning the complexities of the grasses growing there. What a great selection we found, from masses of tufted hair grass to sweet vernal grass and everything in between! Neither could we ignore the other treasures we saw there — 3 kinds of orchid: the heath spotted, the common spotted and, best of all, the fragrant orchid. Rushes, horsetails and sedges were also under our scrutiny, including a mound of hair moss that must be at least 10 feet across and a foot high and growing!


The day we spent with butterflies and Tom Prescott was very rewarding, ensuring we could confidently identify all the butterflies we are likely to see in South Loch Ness. Tom asked us to pay particular attention to looking for the priority species: the Pearl-bordered Fritillary, the Northern Brown Argus and the Chequered Skipper. He also asked us to watch for the Mountain Ringlet, which is spreading northwards and has reached the Cairngorms.
