<u>Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust – News Update.</u> Please read this – It may affect you!

White Goods Offer.

This will close on the 1st. of October. If you have had a letter from SSE and have not yet taken it up you should do so by this date.

Energy Efficiency Phase 3 Grants.

All private households in the area will have recently received a letter from the Community Trust detailing how the Glendoe Energy Efficiency monies are being spent. With the level of interest already shown the money currently available under phase 3 is unlikely to fund more than 10 applications at the present time. However the Directors would like to maintain the energy efficiency initiative so when further funds come on stream there is a good likelihood that grant applications can again be considered. Application forms can be obtained from the Secretary.

The following will be eligible in privately owned dwelling houses:

PV and Solar Thermal panels.

Wood, bio mass and wood pellet fuelled heating systems.

Ground and air source heat pumps.

Water and wind turbines.

Single to double glazing.

Excluded – replacement double glazing and new build installations.

Foyers Public Convenience

Many of you will already be aware that Highland Council have decided to close this facility despite there being more than 50,000 visitors to the Falls of Foyers each year. Ownership and running costs are likely to be taken over by the Community Trust and the Community Council before the end of the year.

Renewable Energy Awareness Course Inverness College UHI SEAM Centre.

Earlier in the year the Trust met the cost of sending 6 members of the Community on a two day course dealing with all of the technical aspects of the many new devices and installations which have become available. Everyone agreed that it was very worthwhile. The course is being repeated on the 15th. and 16th. of November and on the 14th. and 15th. of December. The Highland Council Aird & Loch Ness Ward Forum Stratherrick Hall - Gorthleck

Thursday 22nd September - 7.00 p.m. to 8.30 p.m.

(Doors open at 6.30 p.m.)

The Ward Forum will enable people to raise issues of local concern; scrutinise local council service delivery and performance; and promote or encourage all aspects of Community Safety. The Forum will be convened by the Council, will last for approx. one and a half hours, and will provide an opportunity for members of the public to ask questions about any matter during a 20 minute session at the end of the meeting.

The theme of the Forum will be **Timber Extraction and Transport.** Julian Fryer, Forestry Commission Scotland, will make a presentation regarding current and pending harvest arrangements as well as future plans. Mike Stephens, Highland Council TEC Services, will also be available to answer questions regarding the Council's responsibilities in relation to timber extraction and transport.

Solar Power comes to Edinuanagan Croft, Torness.

Our house at Edinuanagan Croft, Torness, is very old, probably initially being one of the original "black houses" of the strath. We have lived here since the early eighties and when we moved in there was no running water or plumbing in the house, and electricity had only recently been installed. The house is wooden lined with walls nearly a metre thick and has a low pitched corrugated iron roof.

We love this house and haven't done a lot really to change its character, but over the years have altered and added on as our needs changed and now have a proper kitchen, living room, bathroom, shower room, porch and extra bedrooms.

Earlier this year we heard that the Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust were starting a scheme whereby households in the area would be eligible

for a grant of £3000 towards energy saving improvements and we started thinking about how we could improve our energy usage and become a bit "greener".

We thoroughly researched our options and had a couple of meetings with an Energy Savings Scotland advisor and decided that a solar thermal panel made sense for us as it would cut down our reliance on oil, by helping to heat the water, when our wood burning stove was not on and to save putting the oil boiler on.

Initially we had installed a wood burning stove to heat the water and as a later addition, an oil fired central heating system. The central heating system was supposed to have a hot feed from the stove but this had never worked properly. We needed a heating engineer to remedy it so we met up with a local specialised solar energy installer who came up with an amazingly complex system of "remedial plumbing" to link up the new solar thermal panel to our existing system and also to make our existing two systems much more energy efficient.

The installers we chose did a great job, crawling about in confined spaces with a lot of hi-tech equipment and our attic now looks like the boiler room of a ship! We now have a solar thermal panel on the roof. It helps to heat the water, any excess now going into the central heating. This suits us as our house can be very cold inside in the Summer, due to the thick walls and little windows. Our woodburning stove is now properly linked into the central heating and the water no longer boils off in the tank. We have a lot of thermostats that all "talk to"each other to ensure we don't waste energy, and consequently we now rarely have to use oil. The weather has been awful this summer but it is surprising how much heat we do get from the solar thermal panel and each degree is one degree we don't need oil for.

This system was ideal for us as Alan gets a lot of wood for the stove, as he works in forestry, so heating the water in the winter wasn't a problem. We needed something to help heat the water and house in the summer when we don't necessarily have the stove on. We also needed to maximise the heat from the stove and now that it is properly linked into the central heating we rarely need to put the the oil boiler on.

We are the first household to receive a grant under the scheme and we are very grateful to the Stratherrick and Foyers Community Trust for their help. We would advise anyone else interested in the scheme to research all options as all houses and households are different. The solar thermal panel suits us but may not be the best choice for everyone. Consulting with an Energy Savings Scotland advisor is essential too. We would also recommend getting as many quotes as possible as there was a big difference in quotes- the local company being the cheapest and also the most experienced.

Inverfarigaig Pass Road Closure

Forestry Commission Scotland has arranged a road closure with the Highland Council's TecServices Department for the locality known as the Inverfarigaig pass. This note is intended to inform the local community of the closure, which has been put in place to allow for the completion of the tree felling operation. The road is to be closed for a maximum period of ten weeks commencing on Monday the 5th of September, running through until the 11th of November. The emergency services and the health clinic will also receive notification. The road closure will permit the completion of the tree felling within the pass and also facilitate the removal of trees within the same area that have repeatedly caused issues in blocking the road during the winter period. We seek the Communities forbearance on this matter and apologise for any further disruption this may cause.

The felling operation in the Pass has proven to be more technically challenging than first thought. The unfortunate accident on the site made all of the parties concerned cautious in considering their next steps. After a significant period of planning and discussion with contractor sources, we now have a safe solution for this site, which will complete the operation. We are confident that the work in the Pass will be completed to a high standard and within the stated timeframe.

Can we please stress that this closure is due to the risk of material being dislodged from above, which can then only fall onto the road below. It is of paramount importance that the signage is obeyed, as there will be a real risk to personal safety if it is not.

Again, Forestry Commission Scotland apologises for any inconvenience caused as a result of this further road closure.

Camping and Caravanning Park in Lower Foyers: Update

TEC Services, in their capacity as the Local Roads Authority, have now released their initial consultation response. They are asking the applicants to provide further information regarding:-

- the junction of the B852/Lower Foyers Road: geometry of the junction, visibility
- the Lower Foyers Road itself: provision of passing places and general suitability
- access to the development: space for manoeuvring, visibility, exit/entry arrangements
- pedestrian/cyclist accessibility (footpath link from the Bailey Bridge): The response recognises that 'footpath connections are important for existing residents in achieving Safer Routes to School initiatives and also for the development's customers in accessing local amenities'. However, the design of foothpaths is complicated by the fact that it is unclear when the Bailey Bridge will be replaced and where the new bridge will be located.

Concerns about the suitability of the B852 from its junction with the B862 to Foyers had already been raised at the pre-application stage. To quote from the response: 'It's likely that a significant amount of work would be required in bringing this road up to an acceptable level although the extent of work required has not been established by the developer or by TECS.' The response by TECS suggests that Members of the Planning Committee will have to determine the level of improvements and also who will carry the cost for these.

What will happen next?

Once TECS have received the relevant information from the applicants they will issue a further response to the Planning Department. The case manager at Planning will then make a recommendation for either approval or refusal of the development. This, in turn, will be passed on to the Inverness, Nairn, Badenoch and Strathspey Planning Committee. Two of our Ward Councillors, Margaret Davidson and Hamish Wood are members of this Committee.

Isabella Sarah Hipkin {nee Munro} 1918 – 2011

Sadie was born at 38 Glenlia, Foyers. She lived there with her Mum and Dad, brothers Dan and Willie and sister Grace.

When Sadie was very young there was no bus service and very few car owners. To visit her Granny in Inverness her family had to board the paddle steamer, the "Gondolier", disembark at Aldourie pier and travel the rest of the way by horse and carriage. Even a trip to Inverfarigaig meant taking the "Gondolier".

Sadie left school at the age of fifteen and worked at Knockie Lodge looking after the Campbell children, then on to Brin House, Strathnairn.

She married Jack in Foyers Church when she was 22years old, in June 1940. They celebrated their Golden Wedding in 1990. Sadly, Jack died in April 1991.

Sadie worked in Woolworths for over thirty years and then in the canteen at the Hydro-electric, scheme in Foyers. She and Jack lived at Park Terrace from 1966. She enjoyed life to the full and was full of fun. She was President of the W.R.I. for 20 years and Treasurer



of the Women's Guild. She sang in the Foyers Church choir for over 50 years. She enjoyed playing darts, whist drives and Scottish dancing at the Foyers Club.

Sadie made several trips abroad to Canada and America and went twice a year to Kent to be with her daughter, Alison and husband, Derek. She was very proud of her grand-daughters, Amanda and Heather, and her great-grandchildren, Isobel, Will, Daisy and Naomi.

Sadie had many dear friends, neighbours and carers and without their help and the care of Drs. Lesley and Gregor Mackintosh and staff, she would not have been able to stay in her own home for so long. Sadie went into hospital on 16th March where she enjoyed the chat and latest gossip with her many visitors. She loved chatting about old times and was a source of village information both past and present. She will be sadly missed by everyone.

Alison, Derek and family would like to thank all for their expressions of sympathy at this sad time.

Our friendship with Sadie, which began with our arrival at Foyers Manse in 1993, was one which Ann and myself cherished, and I felt greatly privileged to have been asked by her family to conduct the funeral service at Boleskine Church on the 9th June. It was good to see so many gathered there. The singing of the opening Psalm (the 23rd) was deeply moving.

Sadie had a life-long connection with the Church. She and her late husband Jack married in Foyers Church in 1940; she was a member of the choir and was very active over a long period with what used to be called 'The Church of Scotland Women's Guild'. The Guild motto was 'Whose we are, Whom we serve'. Recently, I heard a speaker describe that motto as 'a gift from God'. He was right! It is! The 'Whose' and 'Whom' referred to, is the Lord Jesus Christ. Christians belong to Him and serve Him. So Sadie's devotion was not to 'the church' but to Jesus, and so I shall always remember Sadie as one who lived her life in and for Christ, and it showed, in every aspect of it.

It is a sad time when we come together to give thanks for someone we knew and loved, and rightly and naturally want to show that, as also our thankfulness when we also want to remember, a long and happy life. (Rev) J. Christie

At Inverfarigaig there was a bobbin mill somewhere close to Island Cottage, about 100 yards from the river mouth, in the 1800s. The bobbins were made from local birch and were for the textile trade: Clark & Co. of the Paisley thread mills, and later a succession of other operators, worked the mill until 1926, when a fire destroyed it.



After that, the Forestry Commission, set up in 1919, purchased land in 1946 in the lower Farigaig valley and a sawmill was built on the site of the bobbin mill with a small group of houses for forestry workers. The tree trunks were sent down from a lay-by on the road above on a chute. Once sawn, the cords of timber were sent by rail - narrow gauge - possibly horse drawn - to the pier, about 400 yards away, for loading onto boats to go down to Inverness and maybe beyond.

The original Telford pier, built around 1810, was extended at about this time, using railway lines as piles. (The above information was obtained from the South Loch Ness Heritage website)



2. Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

Key Worker/Affordable Housing — Cllr. Davidson had arranged a meeting with Albyn Housing and the Highland Small Communities Housing Trust in Inverness on 1st June to discuss the best way forward with the housing projects at Gorthleck and Inverfarigaig. The Chairman and Secretary will attend

Broadband Provision — A copy of the 'Community Broadband Toolkit' was passed to Mr Paul Higham, who had agreed to look into this matter. Mr Stephen mentioned the Tooway Direct satellite broadband system. The Secretary reported that she has this system and finds it very reliable. While not superfast, it is

certainly faster than the very poor landline service she was getting previously. Cllr. Davidson reported that Graeme Ambrose of Destination Loch Ness is in contact with HIE regarding provision of a better broadband service around Loch Ness.

Care in Strathnairn — Mrs Grant has a meeting arranged with Paul Davies, the Co-ordinator, on Friday. Cllr. Davidson advised that some extra funds may be available if needed to extend the scheme to this area.

Drumtemple Cemetery Gate — Mr Sharp reported that there is some damage to the gate, but it is not known if this predates the work which has been done. However, the gate will now open and close properly and will latch.

Public Toilets - Foyers — Mr Stephen attended the meeting to report on this matter. He said that a Committee decision had been taken to close the toilets, partly because they are sub-standard. However, in view of the large number of visitors to the area, and lack of other suitable facilities, a special dispensation

had been obtained to keep the toilets open, initially for this season. The only other toilet available is in the Foyers Cafe, and this is not adequate for the number of visitors. Mr Hargreaves of the shop and cafe is looking after the toilets meantime, and it was noted that they are now spotlessly clean. There was some discussion on the possibility of some sort of community take-over. Cllr. Davidson warned that there are potential difficulties in the CC taking ownership, so the various options will be investigated. The Chairman reported that he had received agreement from the Scottish Communities Foundation that Community Trust money could be used for this project. Cllr. Davidson indicated that the Ward Budget might help towards the cost of installing hot water. In the meantime the CC will register an interest in a community buy-out, and in the HC Comfort Scheme, and Mr Stephen will start the necessary paperwork. The Chairman thanked Mr Stephen for coming along to advise us on

Bottle Banks - Foyers — Cllr. Davidson had spoken to Mr KcKinnie about this and he will arrange for the area to be cleaned up.

5. Planning Matters

(a) New applications:

Forestry access points and loading bays by Abersky, Torness (Mr MacPherson declared an interest)

Replacement porch rear of Farraline, Errogie (Mr Fraser declared an interest)

Two semi-detached bungalows - Smithy Cottage, Errogie (Cllr. Davidson declared an interest in view of her connection with the Highland Housing Alliance. The Chairman and Mr Houston both declared an interest as sponsors of this project on behalf of the Community Trust.)

Temporary siting of static caravan - Druim-an-Ault, Inverfarigaig

Forestry Consultation - South Loch Ness, Erchite Members studied the documentation for these applications and there were no objections.

6. Policing Matters

PC Mathieson reported that there had been a number of break -ins in Fort Augustus. Police are hopeful of solving this shortly. He also reported that successful enforcement action had been taken in relation to a problem reported in Gorthleck.

7. Roads and Signage

(a) Outstanding Matters

Roadside tree clearance - It was reported that the gales over the past 24 hours had left a number of trees hanging' dangerously along the Foyers to Dores road. Cllr. Davidson will request that these are dealt with.

The Chairman reported that work on the Inverfarigaig pass road had still not been completed, despite the six week closure. A further four week closure had been agreed, and it was felt that this should be ample time for the necessary work to be done. The Chairman reported that ditches are choked and need clearing; there is still debris on slopes which is likely to fall into the road and needs removing; the damage to bridge parapets is still to be repaired, and ideally arrangements should be made for this to be done while the road is closed. Cllr. Davidson will arrange a site meeting to review the situation.

Bus shelter Lower Foyers - The Secretary reported that the CC had been advised of yet another delay until possibly July/August for this installation. A new bus shelter had been ordered, although we were advised that a suitable shelter was available in the TECS yard. The Secretary will contact Neil Young to express our disappointment and find out why it has been necessary to

wait for a new shelter.

Run-offs on Torness brae - Mr MacPherson reported that these have been cleared.

Pot-holes Ardochy road - PC Mathieson was recently along this road and thinks they have been repaired.

Timber lorries on Trinloist road - Mrs Grant reported that the road had been quieter, but the severe damage to some areas of the road was still an issue.

Bridge parapet at Boleskine - Enquiries will be made as to when this work will be done.

(b) Other Roads Matters — Cllr. Davidson reported that there is some money in the Capital Programme for minor roads, and there is a bid in for South Loch Ness. She had been told that the wind farm money for roads will not be available until 2013, and not all areas will qualify. She thought there might be a Ward Forum meeting in this area on road improvements, and this would include people involved in negotiating remedial work on roads following timber extraction which, it was agreed, had been a major problem over many years. Cllr. Davidson also reported that a lot of timber is due to be taken out of a number of areas due to the spread of a disease in the trees.

8. Community Project - Gorthleck — Equipment is currently being purchased. The Project Manager has posted notices requesting volunteers to help with setting up the project.

9. Renewable Energy and Community Benefit

Cllr. Davidson reported that she had been very disappointed with the offer made by RES and had advised them of this. RES now wish to have a further meeting, and Charles Stephen is arranging a further meeting with representatives of the three Community Trusts to negotiate further. It was noted that various benefits had been arranged through the Glendoe scheme, such as a

bursary scheme for young engineers. A wildlife Ranger was provided through the Dunmaglass scheme. PC Mathieson, who is the local wildlife protection officer, was keen to meet with the Ranger, and Cllr. Davidson will forward contact details

10. Members' Resignations — The resignations of Mr Steve Hunt and Mrs Julie Hunt were noted.

It was agreed that Mr Houston should now be co-opted as a full, voting member, and also that Mr

Paul Higham be co-opted as a full member, bringing the CC to full membership.

Proposed: Mr A. Sutherland Seconded: Mr D. Forbes

11. Adoption of New Constitution, Standing Orders and Code of Conduct — The new models provided by Highland

Council, having previously been circulated to members, were formally adopted by the CC. Proposed: Mr A. Sutherland Seconded: Mrs E. Merther

12. Any Other Competent Business — Mr Forbes reported that there is an ongoing problem with water lying on the road at Ness-side

due to leaf litter blocking the drainage. Cllr. Davidson will pass this on to one of the Councillors responsible for that area.

Mrs Grant had received enquiries about the availability of firewood from the clearance being done by SSE and also whether some might be delivered to

by SSE, and also whether some might be delivered to pensioners. Enquiries will be made.

Mr Houston expressed concern about the hazard posed by cars parked at the junction of the

Foyers road in Dores during busy times. PC Mathieson will investigate this problem.

Mr Sharp reported a number of large pot-holes on the Garthbeg road. A report will be sent.

Mrs Ellam of Easter Boleskine was present at the meeting and again expressed dissatisfaction at

the way the CC had handled the planning application for a caravan/camping site in Lower Foyers.

Once again the Chairman explained the CC role within the planning process, that the CC had

behaved correctly throughout, and that the CC had gone far beyond what is required of it to

provide information to the community and obtain feedback.

13. Date of Next Meeting — The next meeting will be on Tuesday 28th June 2011 at the Stratherrick Hall in Gorthleck.

1. Adoption of Minutes

Minutes of the meeting held on 24th May 2011 were adopted as a true record.

2. Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

Key Worker/Affordable Housing — The Chairman and Secretary had attended a meeting with representatives of Albyn Housing and the Highland Small Communities Housing Trust regarding the land held by them at Gorthleck and Inverfarigaig. It had been agreed that in view of the extremely long delays with the development at Gorthleck, efforts should be made to take this forward first. In the present difficult economic climate it was felt that the first step should be to release some affordable plots for self-build projects and that, at a later stage, the income from these should help to fund building of other types of housing needed. Cllr. Davidson advised that when plots become available, a mailing to all households in the area could be carried out, and that Highland Council would cover any costs. It was felt that informa-

tion on the proposed schedule for provision of the different types of housing should be included. Cllr. Davidson also advised that people wishing to be considered for property in the Gorthleck scheme should be encouraged to get their names on the Housing Register. It was noted that a fairly recent housing needs survey has been carried out in the area.

Care in Strathnairn — Mrs Grant has been in contact with Paul Davies, the Co-ordinator, and a meeting is to be arranged. It was noted that some local volunteers will be needed. Cllr. Davidson advised that Highland Council may provide additional funding if the area covered by Care in Strathnairn is extended. Mrs Grant reported that a senior citizens' Lunch Group is being set up in Gorthleck, and the Community Trust is providing funds to assist with the set up. Bottle Banks - Whitebridge — A possible site at the junction of the B862 and the Dalcrag road was suggested. Enquiries will be made with Mr Alan McKinnie at Highland Council as to whether this is a suitable position.

Public Toilets - Foyers — Mr Charles Stephen had reported that enquiries are ongoing as to the best way to pass responsibility to the community. In the meantime temporary arrangements for Mr & Mrs Hargreaves of the Foyers Shop and Cafe to look after the toilets have been formalised. These arrangements are in place until 31st October 2011.

3. Foyers Falls Recovery Project — Mr Paul Owen of SSE reported that the work is progressing well. After a slight delay the crossing of the Lower Foyers road is now under way and is expected to be completed in the two days (28th & 29th June). A diversion route past the power station is in place, and the Lower Foyers road is expected to re-open on 30th June. Mr Dave O'Brien of contractors Morgan Sindall explained the plans and showed a diagram of the proposals for crossing the road to Upper Foyers. There will be no complete closure of the road. A diversion for the footpath and a single traffic lane will be created, and traffic-light control will be in place. It is hoped to carry out this section of the work in early August, but information will be provided when more detail on the timing is known. As much warning as possible will be given. The Chairman enquired about the situation with firewood from the cleared areas. Mr Owen confirmed that this has been available for people approaching the Site Manager. The question of the old right of way path behind the factory was raised. This is not the direct concern of the current contractors, and the CC understands that this should be raised with SSE Estates Department. The Chairman confirmed that this had definitely been a right of way. Mr Forbes offered to contact the Estates Department to show them the route of the old path.

6. Planning Matters

(a) New applications:

Guest annexe - The Coach House, Foyers (Full)

Two house plots - Coillie Beag, Easter Drummond, White-bridge (PIP) Members were familiar with the proposed sites and studied the documentation relating to these applications. There were no objections.

(b) Any Other Planning Matter

The Chairman had received a report from Mr Kirkland about heavy construction traffic using

Stratherrick for access to the Beauly - Denny power line site. It was agreed that accurate identification of the vehicles concerned is needed by taking note of registration numbers, and any names on the vehicles, to make sure these are not accessing the Glendoe site. Cllr. Davidson will enquire about the conditions in the access statement for the contract.

7. Policing Matters

Constable Mathieson reported that it looks increasingly likely that all Police control in Scotland will come under one force. Members agreed this is very unlikely to be beneficial to rural communities.

8. Roads and Signage

(a) Outstanding matters

Roadside tree clearance - On-site meetings took place on 20th and 27th June with all the agencies involved in the Inverfarigaig pass contract. The first was attended by Mr Houston and the second by the Chairman. It was agreed that the community has been badly let down by the handling of this contract. The original planned four week closure of the road finally stretched out to 13 weeks, causing problems for local residents, patients attending the Medical Centre, and potentially serious problems for the local Fire Brigade. Contractors are now talking about a further closure in the Autumn. Cllr. Davidson felt that a very poor job has been done on this contract, and that no-one was keeping control of the contractors. A further site meeting is planned for late July. and a member of the CC will attend. There are plans for further clearance along the Glenlia road. It was agreed that much more stringent controls are required in any future contract.

Bus shelter Lower Foyers - Mr Neil Young has confirmed that a new shelter will definitely be installed in late July/early August this year.

Bridge parapets - Boleskine and Inverfarigaig pass. The Chairman reported that the parapets on the pass road have been repaired. TEC Services has informed that the Secretary that Boleskine bridge parapet and road is being monitored. At present the repair work is planned for the Autumn. Damage to Trinloist road by timber lorries - Cllr. Davidson informed the meeting that a report is being prepared on the work required.

Pot-holes on Garthbeg road - The Secretary has been told that TEC Services are aware of this problem and that repairs will be done.

(b) Other Roads Items — The Chairman noted that road narrowing warnings have been provided at the Torness side on the road by Loch Ceoglais, but warnings are needed at the other end of this stretch of road. A request will be sent. It was noted that the traffic priorities at the Calanour junc-

tion have still not been reconfigured. It was minuted in September 2009 that this would be carried out, at the latest, in Spring 2010. Cllr. Davidson will enquire about this. Mr Houston reported that the Torness road damaged a Chisholm's lorry early this year has still not been properly repaired. Some tar and chips were put into the damaged area today, but this is not sufficient. A report will be sent. The Secretary reported that road drains in Lower Foyers between the old bridge and Riverside were completely blocked, causing water to flood down to the bailey bridge, eroding a deep gully beside the road. She had reported this, and the drains have now been cleared.

9. Community Project - Gorthleck — It was noted that some play equipment is now on site. There is further work to be done and volunteers will be needed. Mrs Grant and Mr Houston are due to meet with the Project Manager to take things forward. The question of public liability insurance will need to be checked.

10. Renewable Energy and Community Benefit

The Chairman reported that the Trust is on the verge of an agreement with regard to the Dunmaglass scheme. An improved capital sum has been offered.

11. Any Other Competent Business — The Chairman reported that the Forestry Commission are intending to develop two small scale hydro-electric projects in the area. It was noted that communities may have a share in such projects, and we have already registered an interest. Mr & Mrs Hargreaves had mentioned to the Secretary that they suffer a major loss of trade during the week-end of Rock Ness. She had passed this information to Mrs MacRae in Dores, who is in contact with the organisers, and raised the possibility of some sort of compensation for next year. It was noted that this will need to be raised again in time for next year's festival. There had also been some reports of marshalls turning traffic away from the Foyers road at Dores, and marshalls should be better briefed next year to prevent any misunderstandings.

The Secretary had received a report that changes are to be made to local arrangements for the home carer service, and considerable concern had been expressed about what the arrangements are to be in future. Cllr. Davidson will provide the contact details of the person in charge and the Secretary will write for clarification.

Mr Forbes had noticed that once again bottle banks at Foyers were full and that bottles had been

left around the banks. He wondered about a notice asking people not to leave bottles if the banks were full. The possibility of more frequent emptying is also being pursued. Mr Forbes also noted the very poor state of the second stretch of the cemetery road in Lower Foyers. The first section as far as the gate has had some surfacing work and is not too bad, but the section beyond the gate has deep, muddy ruts, and is very unpleasant for people walking to the cemetery. Cllr. Davidson will raise this matter. Mr Ross raised the matter of damage to the fence around the children's play area in Upper Foyers. Cllr. Davidson reported that the Glenlia Residents Åssociation have a bid in for funding for new fencing, so this should be dealt with before too long.

Mr Houston requested that the firework display this year should be organised under the auspices of the CC, so that it is covered by their public liability insurance. He has covered this himself in the past, but is now finding the cost to himself as an individual prohibitive. Cllr. Davidson believes that CC

insurance may cover an event of this type, but the Secretary will make enquiries.

Mrs Grant reported that Stratherrick School has lost a full-time teacher, who now has a job in Inverness. Again travelling problems have been an issue. There was some discussion on local housing issues. It was noted that the Foyers Schoolhouse is empty. Cllr. Davidson will enquire about this, and also about the likely length of time before a new teacher can be appointed.

Mrs Ellam was present at the meeting and enquired which newspaper had been used to advertise the public presentation of paperwork in relation to the planning application for the camping and caravan site in Lower Foyers. She was advised that advertising had been done locally, as there was not time to place newspaper advertisements. Mrs MacDougall was present at the meeting and expressed concern about speeding traffic on the Foyers road. A notice has already been put in the Boleskine Bulletin. There was discussion on possible ways of dealing with this, and Constable Mathieson noted that the worst offenders in these situations are often local drivers. If people report registration numbers of offenders to the Police, they can be visited and given a warning. This can be done anonymously.

THE KNOCKIE TRUST FUND

At a meeting held on the 16th August 2011 the Trustees of the Knockie Trust Fund agreed to standardise the Christmas Gifts for Senior Citizen Households. The effect of this is that the Christmas Gifts will consist of a £30 M & S Voucher per eligible household. The reason this decision was taken was because of the problems of getting coal prices from a supplier last Christmas.

Those eligible must be aged 65 and lived in the community for 4 years.

Inland Upland and Cold – Gardening on the Edge

This is a tale of woe. I'm talking about wood mice and bank voles. If you keep a dog or a cat you won't have a problem. Perhaps the ways in which I solved the difficulties will be of use to someone or you can just laugh at the lengths I went to.

Last autumn I sowed seeds of the common field poppy, *Papaver rhoeas*. The plants were carefully nurtured through the winter in a cold greenhouse then planted in trays and hardened off. They made good sturdy plants. The idea was to plant them among ox-eye daisies, *Leucanthemum vulgare* and cornflowers, *Centaurea cyanus* – the usual 'farmers' nightmare' combination. So I planted out the poppies and cornflowers and bank voles ate them, every one. The holes of their tunnels were clearly visible at each plant.

The next plants to go were calabrese. Gaps appeared in newly planted rows of peas. This was too much! I found some small meshed chicken wire to protect kohl rabi seedlings. I put plastic bell cloches over curly kale plants. One of the critturs tunnelled into a bell cloche and nipped off the kale. It seemed that everything newly planted was at risk. I also had new campanulas, *Campanula persicifolia 'George Chiswell'* - two good tall stems with lots of buds. I was looking forward to seeing the flowers. A vole nipped off one of the stems. Disheartening! I left the cut stem to see what would happen. (It was chopped into small pieces and taken away). I surrounded the remaining stem with cut thistles. Success! It flowered. Why had I not remembered that this was how I had protected plants previously? After the winter I had plenty of dead holly so I surrounded the peas with bits of that and yet more thistles. Bank voles are averse to having their wee feet and noses prickled. The peas survived.

Gaps appeared in a tray of annual poppies, *Papaver commutatum*, 'Ladybird'. Trays of other seedlings were untouched. One morning I disturbed a wood mouse in the act of eating a poppy. What is it with these critturs and poppies? Do they get high on them? Next day it nipped off some pea seedlings that had been destined to fill gaps in the rows. Fortunately I had sown plenty so when I planted them out I made sure that they were well protected by holly and thistles.

Two years ago I lost all the strawberries to mice and voles. Since then I have surrounded the strawberries with polycarbonate sheeting. Perhaps the voles and mice can't see or smell the berries. This has been successful.

Where are the tawny owls, weasels and pine martens when I need them? They always turn up late in the season. Certainly they have now reduced the population of voles and mice but I'm going to cut more thistles soon to protect the beetroot, just in case.

Introduced for the fur trade in 1938, American mink escaped and by 1962 were breeding in the wild. Now widespread, their presence in the Scottish countryside is recognised as a big problem for many of our native wildlife and game species. Mink are effective predators and eat anything they can catch and overpower. Their diet includes water voles, fish, ground nesting birds and even chickens!

The **Scottish Mink Initiative** has been set up to help communities to protect their local wildlife by providing specially designed floating rafts to monitor mink movements, which helps target trapping effort. 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
