
WINTER BROOD

Inland, Upland and Cold -Gardening on the Edge

Evergreens – what better topic could there be for winter? Evergreens give a garden presence and structure when deciduous trees are bare and perennials are biding their time below ground. We can derive inspiration from the plants which green our surrouding landscape in the colder months and we could plant our gardens in keeping with it.

The roads are lined with whin (gorse) bushes and the occasional broom. Ivy clothes old stone walls, the floor of the woodland and its tree trunks. Juniper and Scots pine stand on our hillsides. Holly is found where deer and rabbits cannot reach.

There are many useful non-native plants too and I shall mention some of them. Beware, however, of garden centre experts peddling dreams. Plants that they guarantee evergreen in the city of Inverness may struggle in the strath. Two examples are Portugal laurel, *Prunus lusitanica* and *Berberis darwinii*. On a Garden Club visit to Inverewe we found the head gardener Kevin Ball lamenting the devastation caused by temperatures of -7°C last winter. I concede that this is severe for Inverewe but when I told him that it had been -20°C in the strath and that Portugal Laurel and *Berberis darwinii* were badly hit, he said that I was gardening on the edge – hence the title of these articles.

This is not to say you musn't try plants like those. It is always worth experimenting. In your own micro climate you may succeed. The ordinary laurel *Prunus laurocerasus* is hardier than Portugal laurel and slow growing forms such as 'Etna' and 'Otto Luyken' are available for small gardens.

If you don't mind their spines and have no young children around, garden versions of whin, *Ulex europaeus* should prove indestructible and give you a good show of bright yellow flowers for much of the year.

Broom, *Cytisus* comes in good garden forms with a choice of many colours. Broom tends to be short –lived but you can always replace it.

I am very fond of holly, *Ilex* but some of my mature plants suffered badly in the winter of 2009/10. Strangely it was the native hollies that were blackened while *Ilex aquifolium* 'Silver Queen' and *Ilex x altaclerensis* 'Golden King' both variegated, did not suffer at all. Thornless holly, *Ilex* 'J C van Tol' in a north facing border was likewise untouched. Holly is one plant that I would be willing to mulch in order for it to thrive.

May I put in a plea for our native juniper, *Juniperus communis*. We are fortunate to have them in this area but they are becoming scarce nationally. If you have a large garden you could plant one. In a smaller space there is no reason that I know of why they cannot be used as a hedging plant. They provide a softer look than box, holly and yew and could be used with them. Curb your desire, however, to stroke the fluffy looking things. They have spines too!

Ground covering junipers do well here and will spread quite fast. Some are - silver blue *Juniperus squamata*, *Juniperus x pfitz-eriana* 'Old Gold' and yellow-green *Juniperus horizontalis* 'Prince of Wales', all hardy to -23°C and not liked by deer or rabbits. They make a lovely carpet all merging into each other and there are many more named varieties. If you want to create a focal point or some height the equally hardy *Juniperus scopulorum* 'Sky Rocket' (up to 10 metres) would do.

Yew, *Taxus baccata* makes the most wonderful hedge and is extremely long-lived. Put in young plants, keep them fed and they will surprise you with their relative speed of growth. Yew is noted for its slow growth but the advantage is that it doesn't need cut very often. If starting with young plants, let the leaders grow to the height you want the hedge to reach and just clip the sides meantime. Keep it well watered until it establishes but don't let the soil form a crust on top which will keep the air from the roots. Fork the soil over gently to stop this happening. It is perhaps best used as an internal hedge in country areas as its bark and cut branches can be poisonous to farm animals. Deer seem to be able to browse on living yew to no ill effect. The yew hedge that I am trying to establish looks a bit ragged because the leaders of some of the plants have been eaten out by these creatures! Again if you want some height, the Irish yew, *Taxus baccata* 'Fastigiata' will grow in a broad column up to 10 metres.

Ivy, *Hedera helix* is good for wild life. I hope you have had some success with it. Neighbours in the strath seem to have no problems in growing ivy. Indeed I have seen them hacking it back. It is not always the best thing to grow on the walls of your house but elsewhere in the garden it is fine or I think it would be if it would grow for me. I should like to use it both as ground cover and vertically but either the deer eat it or it becomes brown and shrivelled. Perhaps I am growing the wrong kinds. There are many pretty variegated named varieties such as 'Goldheart' which in theory should grow here.

Have you a garden large enough to grow our native Scots pine, *Pinus sylvestris*? Obviously it will grow well here but if you haven't the space and yearn for a pine there are small hardy ones available that grow to one or two metres. *Pinus mugo* 'Mops' is one of the best known.

Box, *Buxus sempervirens* is a reliable evergreen that will even grow in dry situations. It makes a dense hedge and also regenerates well if cut back. For small hedges that you might use to edge flower or vegetable beds there is *Buxus microphylla*.. Box also makes delightful balls or pyramids. You can buy small plants and gradually shape them yourself or (for a price) buy ready shaped ones at most garden centres.

A non-native tough edging plant or small hedge that can be used instead of box is the alpine germander, *Teucrium chamaedrys* which has tiny grey-green oval leaves. If you want to keep it in shape it is best not to let it produce its bright pink flower spikes. It is easy from cuttings.

Of shrubs, that Victorian favourite the spotted laurel, *Aucuba japonica* is a real toughie and will grow in any situation. I find the variegated version, the one you most often see on sale, difficult to place. Sometimes I like it and other days I don't. Perhaps it comes into its own in winter and lights up dull spaces. There is a plain green version with glossy pointed leaves called *Aucuba japonica* 'Rozannie' that I planted recently. I think it will make a handsome plant and produce red berries too. The Christmas box, *Sarcococca*, should be hardy here. It is not much to look at but is grown for its perfumed white flowers that open in mid winter. So far it has struggled with me but I may have the wrong kind. Garden centres do not always label them properly. *Sarcococca confusa* is the one you want.

There are many small evergreen ground huggers. The following have proved their worth in my garden. *Bergenia, Cyclamen hederifolium* with its marbled leaves, *Dianthus, Euonymus, Euphorbia, Helleborus, Iberis, Saxifraga x urbium,* and *Vinca.* To describe their merits would need another article.

I'm sure you will have your own favourites to clothe your winter garden in many exciting shades of green. Wee Gairdner

Aspen Survey by B.E.N.

Boleskine Environmental Network has published a short report about Aspen in Stratherrick. Sponsored by the Highland Biodiversity Partnership, the report - A Survey of Aspen in South Loch Ness - is the result of a two-year project run by the group and co-ordinated by John Parrott of Scottish Native Woods. During the spring and summer of 2009, after an initial training session, nine volunteers set about identifying and mapping the location of Aspen stands in the area. A total of 113 stands were recorded. Most are less than 0.2 hectare in extent with many stands comprising only a few trees on crags. However, at least two stands are larger: Fasnagruig (1.15ha) above Inverfarigaig and An Doirlinn (0.61ha) near the River Fechlin. The aspen tree is of great biodiversity value. Aspen supports many rare species such as the aspen hoverfly. If you would like to read the report it is on the Stratherrick and Foyers community web site. www.stratherrick.net

Over the winter B.E.N. will be putting the results of our annual survey of breeding waders (as reported in Sept. BB) on to the web site. Although no breeding pairs of golden plovers were confirmed we have learnt of several sightings of flocks of golden plovers that were seen in the area in the spring. A flock of 15 were seen near Ballindalloch on the south side of Loch Farraline and another flock on the high ground near Druim Teamphuill at the west end of Loch Garth. These may well have been young birds hatched last year and which had not yet established breeding territories.

Christian Comment

The coming year marks the 400th anniversary of a foundational contribution to British Literature. William Shakespeare who lived from 1564-1616 is widely considered the greatest dramatist the world has known. No other writer's plays have been produced so many times in so many countries – quotations from them are part of our everyday language, such as 'the devil is in the detail'. Shakespeare's works have been translated into more languages than any other book apart from the Bible.

In 1611, as the result of four years labours by 54 Scholars who had been called together at Hampton Court by King James VI of Scotland (I of England), an authorised version of the sacred scriptures was produced in contemporary (Shakespearean) English. The Bible was made available throughout our nation influencing our culture, and its message transforming individual lives. It could be said that this Good Book contributed to the formation of Great Britain, and like Shakespearean plays, contributed to the writing and language of the day. Now 400 years later, with the slogan 'BIBLE FRESH' a number of Christian organizations are working together to encourage us all to a fresh appreciation and understanding of this Godgiven revelation of the meaning and purpose of life, so clearly revealed by our Lord Jesus Christ.

At Christmas time we shall hear again those remarkable words at the beginning of the Good News told by the Apostle John:

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made. In him was life; and the life was the light of men.

He came unto his own, and his own received him not. But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on his name: Which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth."

MINUTES OF MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 24th AUGUST 2010 AT THE PRIMARY SCHOOL, FOYERS

Members present: Mr M. Houston (Chairman) Mrs E. Merther (Secretary) Mrs K. Grant (Treasurer)

Apologies received: Mr K. Fraser Mrs L. McAdam Mr A. MacPherson Councillor H. Wood

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

- (a) Key Worker/Affordable Housing No further information has been received. Cllr. Davidson will enquire about progress with the Gorthleck scheme.
- (b) Wade's Bridge at Whitebridge Mr Bateman reported that immediately necessary work is under way, and that parapets and buttresses are being repaired. This initial work is hoped to be complete by mid September. Some of the original cobbled road surface has been discovered, and it is hoped eventually to reveal all of this.
- (c) Fraser Monument & Burial Ground at Foyers The Secretary reported that the Survey and Quotation for necessary work has now been received from Laing Traditional Masonry. Grant funding will now be sought for the amount required £19,340.
- (d) Right of Way through Knockie Estate The Rights of Way Officer has requested that the cattle feeding station be re-sited if possible.
- (e) Broadband Provision The CC has finally received a response from BT, indicating that they have no plans to improve the current situation in this area. Cllr. Hendry has also been in touch with them and received a similar response, indicating that they do not regard improvements in this area as economically beneficial to them. Destination Loch Ness is involved in an application for funds to enable

broadband access for boats on the Loch, which may extend to properties around the shore, but will not benefit anyone away from the shoreline. The CC will continue to press the case with BT, and Cllrs. Davidson and Hendry are pursuing the matter further. It was felt that in an area so dependent on tourism, and with so much business now internet dependent, the attitude of BT is unacceptable.

Planning Matters

New applications:

House & granny flat - Land north of Bridge Cottage, Torness (Full)

House - Development site at Foyers Stores (In principle)

Site visits were arranged.

House at Land 150m East of Easter Drummond Whitebridge (reserved matters) No objections.

Roads and Signage

- (a) Outstanding Matters The Secretary had made enquiries about replacement of the culvert at the Calanour junction. This has been delayed due to wet weather but is now scheduled to go ahead. Mr Angus Fraser was present at the meeting and indicated that this work is now due to start.
- (b) Bridge at Lower Foyers Cllr. Hendry reported that unfortunately he had not been able to secure any of the money from the cancelled Ness Hydro Scheme. However, Cllr. Davidson is continuing with the preliminary work required, in the hope that "slippage" money will become available from larger schemes. She emphasised that with a new Local Plan due we will need to stress the need for a new bridge, with all the economic and social benefits this will provide.
- (c) Other Roads Items
- (i) The Chairman attended a meeting with members of TEC Services organised by Cllr. Davidson, when South Loch Ness roads were discussed. Details of the work proposed in relation to the wind farm projects at Corriegarth and Dunmaglass were presented. There will be further wind farm funds available over a number of years for road improvements in the area, and members should forward to the Chairman details of problem areas where work is needed, so that bids for funding can be made.
- (ii) It was noted that the road opposite the junction to Lower Foyers has still not been cleared, and half of the road is still closed. Cllr. Davidson will make enquiries.
- (iii) The Forestry Commission indicated that they intended to start clearance along the roadside on the tunnel road in August. There is no sign of this as yet, other than one or two paint marks. Mr Sutherland reported that they have started pushing in some new forestry roads in the Inverfarigaig gorge for major timber clearance, but have still not held the promised community consultation about the work required along roads in the area.
- (iv) Mr Nicol enquired about the progress with the 30 mph speed limit through Foyers. The Secretary reported that this had been overlooked by TEC Services, but is now in hand.
- (v) Mr Nicol also noted the need for trees/vegetation to be cut back along the school road in Foyers. It was also reported that the small parking area outside the school gates is to be extended.

(vi) Mr Sutherland reported that Errogie residents were concerned about the speed of traffic through the village, and had requested a speed limit. Cllr. Davidson will request speed monitoring with a view to getting a speed limit. Mr Sutherland also reported that discussions are continuing with a view to making improvements at the bad corner in Errogie.

(vii) It was noted that there has been some significant damage to road edges, and a lot of stone debris across the roads around Lower Foyers following the recent abnormally heavy rain. Cllr. Hendry has taken a note of problem areas and will ask TEC Services to deal with them.

Community Project - Gorthleck

The Chairman reported that the Project Manager has secured a grant of £22,394 from Leader funding, and the project can now go forward.

Renewable Energy and Community Benefit

Mr Sutherland reported that a further meeting is scheduled to continue discussion regarding the level of Community Benefit from the Dunmaglass scheme.

Any Other Competent Business

- (a) Mr Forbes presented an update regarding the proposed caravan/camping site. He reported that a pre-planning meeting has taken place, and he and his wife are waiting to hear from the Planning Department regarding any problems.
- (b) The Secretary had received notification that the gentleman planning a Loch Ness ferry is to place an advert in the Boleskine Bulletin requesting letters of support for his scheme.
- (c) Cllr. Davidson reported that British Waterways are now planning to go ahead with a survey of the pier at Foyers with a view to repairs/improvements.

Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

- (a) Key Worker/Affordable Housing Cllr. Davidson reported that there are likely to be further delays with the Gorthleck scheme into the next financial year, due to the current budget cuts. She will request some further discussion with HSCHT and Albyn Housing regarding the housing mix.
- (b) Wade's Bridge at Whitebridge Mr Bateman reported that the initial work on the bridge is almost complete.
- (c) Fraser Monument & Burial Ground at Foyers The Secretary is continuing with enquiries as to possible sources of funding for renovation.
- (d) Broadband Provision The Secretary has sent a further letter to the head of BT in Scotland (copied to other involved parties) expressing our concern about the very unsatisfactory situation in this area. An

acknowledgement has been received from MSPs, but so far no response from BT. Cllr. Davidson reported that Graeme Ambrose for Destination Loch Ness is proceeding with an application for funding for wireless broadband around the Loch. This would be nefit not just Loch side communities, but customers further 'inland'.

Planning Matters

(a) New applications:

Alterations, extension, new garage - Old Chapel, Foyers (Full)

Change of previous outline permission for two houses to one house -Land at Cnoc An T-Sionnach, Whitebridge (PIP) Site visits had already been undertaken. There were no objections.

Stratherrick and Foyers Community Website

The community website is live, containing all the local information you will ever need as a resident of Stratherrick and Foyers.

(b) Other planning matters: Forestry Consultation re felling licence at Croftdhu, Errogie. Members were concerned that any damage to the road due to the timber extraction should be made good. The Chairman will take photographs of the road in its current state in case these are needed.

A copy of the Highland Wide Development Plan has been received. The Chairman will look through this for any items of which the CC needs to be aware.

Policing Matters

No Police representative was present. Enquiries will be made about the possibility of a Police representative attending some of our meetings. Members feel that Police contact with the CC can be very valuable.

Roads and Signage

(a) Outstanding Matters

Culvert, Calanour junction - Mr A. Fraser was present at the meeting. He reported that the culvert has now been replaced, and road surfacing should be completed shortly.

Junction to Lower Foyers - Concrete blocks have now been removed. Mr Fraser reported that the ditch at the foot of the rock face will be cleared shortly, to reduce the risk of falling rocks rolling into the road.

Surface damage/pot holes road to Lower Foyers - After further complaints by the Secretary and Mr Nicol, the two largest pot holes have been filled. However, the entire road surface in this area needs attention, and the ditch needs clearing to prevent the constant stream of water across the road at this point, which is the cause of the problem. A very large 'sink hole' at the edge of the tarmac slightly lower down also needs attention.

Tree clearance - It was noted that trees have still not been cleared back from the roadside after last winter. The Trinloist and Loch Bran roads were mentioned in particular, but the same problem applies to most roads in the area. Questions were raised about arrangements for road gritting and snow clearance this winter. Cllr. Davidson will try to arrange a meeting with Richard Evans to clarify matters. The forestry have done some clearance on the tunnel road, but it is not known if they have completed this or if they are working elsewhere in the area. Cllr. Davidson will make enquiries.

Cllr. Davidson is making enquiries about provision of a speed limit through Errogie.

(b) Bridge at Lower Foyers - Cllr. Davidson reported that although the bridge is on the list for replacement, it has a low priority, and we need to emphasise the importance of a replacement to maintain a viable community in Lower Foyers. She also pointed out that the only feasible land available for further housing in that area will not be developed as long as the community is without a permanent bridge. It was also suggested that a flood alert monitor should be provided for the bailey bridge. Cllr. Davidson will look into this.

(c) Other Roads Items

- (i) A complaint about water running across the road adjacent to 'An Clachan' in Gorthleck had been received. This will be reported.
- (ii) The Chairman reported that a section of culvert under the road about 350 yards below Bochruben Farm on the corkscrew road has badly collapsed and needs attention. This will be reported.
- (iii) Cllr. Davidson reported that funds had been provided from the Ward budget to improve the Vennel road, where there had been serious problems last winter.

Water and Sewerage

Complaints were received about the disruption caused by Scottish Water in their handling of work on the water main. Customers received notices informing them that water would be cut off from 10.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. on three successive days, with no mention of provision of emergency supplies. This was done at very short notice, forcing businesses and other premises to close. People attempting to contact Scottish Water could get no information and no response to emails and phone messages. It was agreed that the CC will write expressing concern and dissatisfaction at the way this matter was handled.

Community Project - Gorthleck

The Chairman reported that two funding sources are now guaranteed. The final application to the Trust is now going in, and if this funding is secured then the first work should go ahead before Çhristmas.

Renewable Energy and Community Benefit

Mr Sutherland had reported by phone that negotiations on Dunmaglass and Corriegarth are ongoing.

Cllr. Davidson reported that a meeting between communities has been suggested to agree some standard procedures to deal with these situations.

Any Other Competent Business

- (a) Mrs McAdam reported that Scottish & Southern Energy had received a formal complaint about the state of the footbridge adjacent to the fish farm in Lower Foyers. This had resulted in a full survey, and the bridge is now closed. It will be replaced at some time in the future, but it is not known when this will be done.
- (b) Mr Bateman noted that Remembrance Sunday this year is on 14th November. The Chairman agreed to lay the wreath at the War Memorial in Gorthleck on behalf of the CC. Mr Bateman will ask Mr John Campbell to obtain the wreath as usual.
- (c) The Secretary reported that she had been contacted by Mr Bruce Ferguson of the Forestry Commission asking for suggestions on how to improve visitor experience on the Forest Estate. They would like suggestions about additional facilities for the area. If members send her any ideas they have she will forward them to Mr Ferguson. He has already spoken with Graeme Ambrose of DLN.
- (d) Cllr. Davidson reported that the Glenlia residents hope to obtain Leader funding for their park/recreational area.
- (e) The Chairman reported that arrangements for the next Community Council election are in hand. The election will take place in November, on a date to be fixed. The final meeting of the current CC will be in October.

Date of Next Meeting

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 26th October 2010 at the Primary School in Foyers.

EWEN FRASER

(1926 - 2010)

Ewen Fraser was born in Oldtown, Stratherrick in 1926, the third of eight children born to John and Marjory Fraser. He started farming at the age of fourteen in Migovie, and also latterly in Gorthleck Mains. In 1955 he married Ella MacKenzie and they were blessed with a family of three sons and one daughter. A quiet family man Ewen especially enjoyed being surrounded by his grand- children in his latter years. As a result of deteriorating health, his last two years were spent in Highview House Care Home where he was lovingly cared for by the devoted staff. Farming in Stratherrick all his life, he particularly enjoyed lambing seasons for over sixty years.

He was a well respected farmer in the Strath and the wider farming community. His knowledge and advice was often sought by others and his expertise in sheep shearing has been mentioned frequently since his passing.

Farming was not his only contribution to the life of the Strath. He served as a member of the Community Council for a number of years where he always sought to do his best for the community he so loved.

However first and foremost in his life was his desire to serve the Lord. He served as an elder in Stratherrick Free Presbyterian Church for many years and as he put it himself "kept the door of the church open". He had a particular love of the Psalms and even when his illness had progressed to the stage where he could communicate very little, he was still able to recall some of the words which had been a comfort to him for so many years.

He passed away peacefully on 17th September and was buried in Dores Cemetery. The large turn out at his funeral bore testimony to the high regard in which he was held.

David Marshall 1927-2010

It is with much sadness that we report the death of David Marshall of Comeraich along the Vennal. David had been in frail health for some months and finally succumbed to cancer of the liver. He was nursed at home until he died which was what both he and Jean wished and was with Jean and his animals until the end. His children were able to come up and spend time with him which he much enjoyed.

David and Jean bought their much loved cottage 30 years ago and

spent every moment that they and their children could, up here. After David retired they decided to take the plunge and move permanently to Gorthleck. David's grandparents on both sides were Scots and he felt that he had finally come home when he settled finally in Comeraich. A quiet and observant man with a fund of stories about his time in Covent Garden Market and, as so many friends have remarked since his death, a man you could count on always, who knew simply that what is right is right. He was a man of wide and varied interests, but particularly he enjoyed wildlife, about which he was very knowledgeable. As he became less mobile his bird watching was a great comfort to him. He loved Scotland and died where he would have wanted to. The most often term used by his many friends at his funeral was that he was "an honourable man". He leaves two daughters and a son and six grandchildren. Much loved and very sorely missed.

Giving the Community Space - new project in Gorthleck





Notes for contributors

For submissions to the BB an A4 page has about 400-500 words, half a page has about 200. Pieces should be of no more than one page. Obviously the Community Council Minutes need to be longer.
