1909 School Medal returns to FOYERS.


Mr Arthur Alderdice from Glasgow recently contacted Frank Ellam of The South Loch Ness Heritage Group. Arthur had in his possession a medal, issued in 1909 by The Foyers Public School - now known as the Foyers Primary School of course.

The medal records that it was presented by E.E.Eccles Esq to Catherine McFadyen on being elected Dux Girl for 1909.

Mr Eccles was the manager of the British Aluminium factory in Foyers. It seems that they sponsored medals each year for the top boy and the top girl in the

school. The medal is hallmarked silver,

assayed in Birmingham 1909 and measures just less than two inches in diameter with a scroll motif at the top and a ring for attaching to a ribbon.



Our grateful thanks go to Arthur. It is very touching to have this medal back in Foyers. It would be interesting to find our more about Catherine McFadyen perhaps your grandparents were at school with her? Please let Frank Ellam or the BB know if you have heard of the McFadyen family.

The Annual General Meeting of the Trust was held on 27 February in Stratherrick Hall. The Chair's report is on the Community website – www.stratherrick.net. There was a query on the annual accounts so they will be reviewed, submitted and approved at a future meeting. Helen Grainger and Andy Holt resigned as Directors of the Trust and we thank them for their time, hard work and their valuable contributions over the years.

The Trust welcomes new Directors, Liz Merther and Morag Cameron, appointed by the Community Council. The Trust wishes to appoint a further two Directors - six applications have been received.

At the AGM there was an open discussion about the Articles of Association and the lack of communication about the work of the trust. Therefore a number of actions will be taken forward.

- 1. The Trust will look at how it can improve its communication and use a variety of methods to ensure everyone is well informed
- 2. a survey will be sent to every member of the community seeking views on what type of projects should be considered for future funding and
- 3. the Trust will hold an open meeting and a lawyer will be present to answer questions about the Articles of Association

If you wish to apply for a grant, there are three application forms as follows:-

Grants up to £1,000; Grants over £1,000; Energy Saving Grant - up to £3,000

All the forms are on the website but if you are unable to access the web, please ask for the appropriate form from the secretary.

The Chair, Helen Grainger, presented her annual report and an extract is shown below:-

"The Community Trust has a mandate from the Community Council to act as the Negotiator for community benefits monies from various green enemy schemes within the community. The Trust acknowledges the need to move forward with the times and to equip itself to meet future challenges. Among these is the ability to convert annual income into long term investments, appoint new directors and employ staff. Energy Efficiency still remains at the heart of the Trust's business and I am pleased to report that over the last year £32,017 has been awarded to 14 individuals. Money can be awarded up to the value of 50% of the cost, not exceeding £3000 in total. These energy efficiencies for Green Technology improvements such as Solar Thermal; Photo Voltaic panels, replacing single to double glazing and Biomass heating. We do not pay retrospective grants so please make an application to the Trust first. Trust Directors will be happy to assist any resident to complete their application.

Over the last year, 15 organisations have applied to the Trust and £23,527 in grants has been paid. Senior Lunch Club, Loch Ness Luvvies, St John's Cemetery Volunteer Group, Community Council Website, 3 young people awarded Grants, Stratherrick and Foyers Primary schools, Parent and Toddler Group, Jubilee Party, Olympic events, Rainbow and Brownies and Guides Pack and a Contribution towards a community defibrillator. We have received a lump sum of £100,000 from RES Renewable Energy Company as a first payment in respect of Dumnaglass Wind Farm".

HUGE SUB STATION PROPOSED FOR TORNESS

Scottish Hydro Electric Transmission PLC, part of SSE, owns and maintains the electricity transmission network in the north of Scotland. To enable the transmission of power generated from the two wind farm developments in the area. Dunmaglass and Corriegarth SSE are planning to build a new substation at Torness. <u>They are holding a Public Consultation on Monday 15th April 2013 – Stratherrick Public Hall 3pm -7pm</u>

WIND FARM UPDATE

Stronelairg: The planning consultation has now ended. Highland Council has deferred their decision until they have had a site visit. It is the Scottish Government however who make the final decision on these larger schemes. There is considerable opposition to the development nationwide due to intrusion into wild land and the impact on the peatlands.

The **Dell Wind Farm** developers have not submitted the planning application as yet. This scheme is still at a scoping stage. Keep an eye on the press as lodging your objections is time limited.

The proposed substation at Torness is a consequence of the wind factories. Power from the turbines on the hills has to be carried across the straths of the Highlands. In our case from — Dunmaglass, Corriegarth, and possibly Dell and Stronelairg. The projects don't stop with the turbines - they are just the start of development. Did we have an indication that a substation would have be so large or where it was to be?

CHLORAMINES IN DRINKING WATER

Scottish Water has sent a letter to all households recently with information on a change in the chemical treatment of tap water. Instead of chlorine, water will soon be treated with **chloramine** – a mixture of chlorine and ammonia. While chlorine evaporates into the air relatively quickly, chloramine is more stable and will persist in the water system; one of the reasons why it is toxic to fish and aquatic life. Chloramine is the easiest of the options available to treat water. However, though the use of chloramine is convenient and cheap, it may not be safe.

There is growing evidence that chloramine forms toxic byproducts as it disinfects and causes more rapid deterioration of valves and water pipe fittings. Unfortunately, there have been very few studies on its long-term impact on human health.

As Erin Brockovitch (yes, the real person portrayed by the film) has said in a 2010 report about the use of chloramines in the USA "there are safer alternatives" and "we should stop cutting corners where health and safety are at stake".

PROPOSED HYDRO SCHEME AT KNOCKIE

The lovely woodland walk down to the boathouse on the shores of Loch Ness at Knockie will shortly be closed to the public for the summer. Another hydro-scheme is to be constructed down through the gorge. A weir will be erected at the mouth of Loch nan an Lann by the old stepping stones with a pipe running down the route of the old track, a power station will be built by the waterfall near the shore. The woodland is a sight of European importance (SAC) and it is within the Easter Ness SSSI. The planning application will be submitted in the next few months.



Canoe Trail Rest

Foyers Trailblazer Rest is nearing completion. A small area has been cleared and levelled to accommodate a few tents and there is a composting toilet housed in a beautiful log cabin as well as a fire pit surrounded by logs for seating. The canoe rack is in place but work has still to start on a three-sided shelter. The popular footpath along the shore below the Fraser Monument is to be improved as well.

The Great Glen Ways Partnership [British waterways Scotland, Forestry Commission Scotland, Highland Council and Scottish Natural Heritage] created the Great Glen Canoe Trail with financial support from the European Development Fund and the Foyers Trailblazer Rest is one of two such rest-stops along the loch. The other one is at Knockie. The log-cabin toilet was built by the Tsarina and Imperial Dacha Co. Ltd., a company based in southern Scotland using Scottish trees which are shaped using hydro power. They use linseed oil, a natural treatment, to preserve the buildings which can be expected to last around 150 years.

This site has been developed with care for the environment and has minimal impact on the views from the beach or from the water. An appropriately sized camp-site for our small village.

Inland, Upland and Cold – Gardening on the Edge

Are you, as I am, madly catching up on those parts of the garden you didn't manage to tidy in the autumn? Now that wind-blown leaves have been removed I can at last see emerging snowdrops. Tight globes of yellow aconite buds are on view as I write and if the sun continues, they will open and very soon crocuses and daffodils will be on show.

Have you identified what has been looking really good in your garden over the winter? For me it is always evergreens and I dearly wish that I had mature plants of these desirable things. From the direction of Dores going in to Inverness along Island Bank Road there is a feast of evergreens for your eyes. Planted long ago they provide one of the most pleasant approaches to the city, even in winter. So let's plant feathery chamaecyparis, shiny laurel and Portugal laurel, holly, box and above all yew to give our gardens substance for the future.

As to smaller evergreens, I have just now some handsome plants of stinking hellebore, *Helleborus foetidus*, a British native. Don't be put off by the name. The smell is not too bad and only if you cut or bruise it. It grows about 60 cm tall, thrives in shade and has palmate dark green shiny leaves. It comes into its own in spring with many yellow-green cup-shaped flowers edged with reddish-purple. Unfortunately, it suffers from leaf-spot, first on the lower leaves, but I have found that if I cut those off, most of the leaves survive unscathed.

Other evergreens looking good here are variegated saxifrage, Saxifraga umbrosa variegata and Euonymus forunei 'Emerald'n' Gold', both providing a splash of yellow much needed on dull winter days.

Weston Robertson, Struthan, Errogie.

16th July 1935 - 12th January 2013

Weston was born in Haddington on 16th July 1935, the fifth of six boys. During World War 2 his family moved to Dumfries where his father had been sent to take up a foreman's position at the ICI factory. Weston attended Dumfries Academy until 1950. He enjoyed playing football and was scouted by Preston North End, but chose to enlist in the army rather than chance a life as a professional footballer! He continued to enjoy sports in the army playing rugby, football, hockey and badminton. Weston enjoyed army life and the traveling it involved. His first overseas posting was to Singapore and it was during a period of leave to Penang that he met Irene and a year later they were married in Singapore in April 1956. Their daughter Janet was born in 1963 whilst on a posting to Hampshire then off to Aden from 1966 - 1967. Westons favourite posting came next, off

to the Falkland Islands to work with the Americans in South Georgia. This was in 1968, fourteen years before the Falklands conflict so many people had no idea where this was! On his return to the UK and a year spent on British soil off to Iran during the reign of the Shah, a peaceful time then! After over thirty years service Weston was ready to settle down and the family moved to Stratherrick early in 1983.

Mr & Mrs Bailey (Whitebridge Hotel) asked Weston and Irene to move into the Hotel whilst they took their annual holiday to look after it and, always up for a new challenge, they leapt at the offer. During their time here they met and formed long lasting friendships with the people of Stratherrick.. Bill Brailsford (keeper at Garrogie Estate) was asked by Weston if he could join in the "grouse shoot" as a beater and so began a new chapter of his life lasting 15years "up the hill ". Being a ponyman on the estate, among other things, was a very special time for him.

During his time spent in Errogie he was also a member of the Stratherrick Hall committee, kept busy and out of mischief, along with Janet Sutherland, Michael MacDonald and several other helpers who organised the annual Stratherrick Highland Games which involved playing five a side football with a five foot inflatable ball and various stalls and money making schemes!

These were great fun and still fondly remembered by many- probably mainly by the tourists on buses diverted into the car park and held "Robin Hood style" until they had helped to boost funds!

Weston had a happy life in Errogie with many visits to and from his daughter and grandson in Kyle of Lochalsh where he died peacefully on 12th January surrounded by his family.

<u>Training to fight fires and search for anyone</u> <u>trapped inside smoke-filled buildings.</u>

Fighting a fire and searching for people trapped in smoke filled buildings is the most dangerous part of our job. An accepted mantra is that we will take calculated risks to save savable lives but will not risk the lives of others to save those we know have perished. At any incident, the officer in charge is under extreme pressure to commit his/her firefighters even when lives are clearly already lost, so this mantra helps to manage the very high level of emotion that all of us experience when attending a building fire. It ensures that the operation is carried out thoughtfully and not just through an emotional 'red mist'.

Fighting a fire is both exciting and humbling. Exciting because there are high levels of danger and uncertainty and 'humbling' because the speed and ferocity with which a fire can grow demands respect. No building fire will be the same, however there are patterns of fire behaviour that we need to recognise. Two of them, you may have heard of: Backdraught and Flashover.

A 'Backdraught' is a potentially lethal situation, where hot gases suddenly explode out of a newly opened doorway engulfing those who have opened the door.

A 'Flashover' is when a 'fire in a room' rapidly becomes a 'room on fire'. Because of the extreme heat generated by a fire, Fire fighters can get caught out by furniture or carpets etc. spontaneously catching fire behind them and effectively

cutting off their escape route. Again, this is a lethal situation which we guard against through good training.

We practice fighting fires and searching for trapped persons in our Fire House at Aberarder and at the Invergordon training centre. Moving through an unfamiliar smoke-filled building is not easy. We team up as a pair, don our breathing apparatus and plunge into the blackness and the heat. As a pair, we are utterly reliant on each other. One of us is carrying the heavy 45mm hose and feeling her way along the wall, which acts as a main reference point in the pitch blackness. The other is at her side, holding on to the tunic of his partner and stretching out into the middle of the room. We 'feel' with our feet and with the back of our hands and move as quickly as we can through a room, searching under furniture and inside cupboards etc., hoping we will find the person who is trapped. All this is done in the pitch dark, mostly in a crouched position, while lugging a heavy hose and dealing with any hot gases or fires as they appear. The trick is to control the adrenalin and remember exactly which rooms we have searched and how to get back out the way we came.....not easy in unfamiliar surroundings in the dark. Our air tanks will last 30 minutes and, by judging things well, we should be leaving the building with just enough air left and quickly brief the next team who will continue the search from where we left off. On removing the breathing apparatus, our faces are red and hair and tunics soaking with sweat. It's hard work but of course ultimately rewarding if a life is saved as a result.

MAN V. HORSE

SUNDAY 21st APRIL, 2013

After a very successful inaugural Man V Horse competition on 6^{th} May 2012, a small group (including runners and riders) have got together to carry this event on again next year under the South Loch Ness Access Group – hoping to make it bigger and better. The start time will be a little later – 11. a.m. with a compulsory briefing at 10.30. It is a linear route of approx. 26 km and finishes at Drummond Farm, Dores.

Static water stations will be provided at the Forestry centre in Inverfarigaig and also at the foot of the Fair Haired Lad's Pass.

In 2012 we had about 10 runners and 10 riders tackling the course which included several good climbs, including the Fair Haired Lad's Pass. The views were stunning from lots of locations on the route. The amount of hill evened out the times very well between the club runners and riders. Just one "elite" horse

managed to get a fair distance ahead of the nearest runner to win the beautiful Jacobite Warrior Perpetual Quaich, which goes to the winner, either runner or rider. £100 cash prize went to the winner, sponsored by the South Loch Ness Tourist Group (www.visitlochness.com). Small quaichs were presented to the fastest runner and the fastest rider. All competitors received either medals (for the runners) or rosettes for the riders.

50% of all profits (including sponsorship) will be donated to the Teenage Cancer Trust this year as our chosen charity and the other 50% will stay with the South Loch Ness Access Group. The entry fee for both runners and riders is £10 at the time of placing the entry plus a minimum of £20 in sponsorship to be paid on the day of the event. Horses must submit to veterinary inspections as a condition of entry. Horses must be shod of booted for the duration of the event.

This year the event will start at the Whitebridge Hotel. Parking for horses will be in and around the village so please obey the parking stewards. The hotel will have a special pasta meal on its menu the evening prior to the event and (depending on uptake) there will be a celebration ceilidh either in Dores or in Whitebridge on the Sunday night.

Aspen. Work has been undertaken to strengthen the position of the aspen (Populus tremula) stand on the hill above the Farigaig visitor centre. Local contractor John Parrott, working through the charity organisation Coille Alba, took on the task. This stand of aspen is possibly one of the largest stands around the Inverness area, outside of Strathspey, which makes it both unusual and special. Aspen is a native tree and could be and important species to woodland management in the future, but it is very vulnerable to browsing by mammals when young. Look closer at the woodland around the Farigaig visitor centre, Dun Deardail and Hill head and you should notice quite a lot of young aspen in the woodland edge. FCS propose to survey this during 2013 and consider how this could be managed to secure it as long term component of the local woodland. Aspen is home to several highly specialised species including the Aspen hoverfly (Hammerschmidtia ferruginea) and the very attractive yellow and brown bordered Dark Bordered Beauty moth (Epione vespertaria).

<u>Juniper</u>. Thank you to everyone who sent in records about where they had seen juniper in the local area. This was very helpful. Regretably, yet another tree disease has been confirmed in the UK recently and this one affects juniper. It is a fungal root infection caused by Phythopthora austrocedrae and there have been two sites confirmed with this disease close to Inverness; although not around Farigaig at present. We are still learning about this infection. Rhododendron. FCS will start to do more work to remove rhododendron from the forest estate along South Loch Ness over 2013 and 2014. This work supports the national initiative to control very invasive plant species that can threaten more important native habitats.

<u>Planning and operations</u> We will be commencing work on the review of our long term forest plan in the summer. This piece of work will take 9-12 months to complete and we are keen to work with the community as part of this. We will provide more information in the next edition. As part of this we have started a strategic review of timber haulage in the forest and will approach the community for their thoughts later this year. Last year's operations are all but complete and this year's programme of work will be starting shortly.

The Red Squirrel walk

With the days stretching out again, it's tempting to get outdoors and make the most of it. Plants are getting into gear for the growth season and buds are already swelling and bulbs beginning to bravely push through the soil. Animals and becoming more active and it's hard to miss the increase in birds song, the increase in the number of mole hills and even the first few brave insects. Red squirrels are also getting more active as they enjoy the longer days and start finding a mate for the summer ahead.

On Saturday 18 May, the Red Squirrel walk will take place early in the morning from 6 to 8am. Early morning is a great time to spot wildlife, most mammals are just settling down to sleep after a busy night and birds are waking up for the day. We'll be trying to spot some of these charismatic animals and enjoying the feast of bird song. Before the end of March small trees and Rhododendron ponticum are being cleared from the Foyers falls and gorge viewpoints to open up the views.
