# MONTHLY CRIME REPORTS FOR STRATHERRICK & FOYERS

At the last Community Council meeting held at Foyers Power Station in December, a new initiative by The Northern Constabulary on policing in the Highlands was announced by P.C. Torquil Macleod. He said "the police hope that it will be proactive as opposed to reactive". In past years, twice yearly reports which covered large geographical areas were issued to community leaders. Starting in January 1999, a report will be presented each month at local Community Council meetings. It will become a regular item on the agenda. This report will highlight crimes that have taken place in the area over the past month and will identify any areas of concern that the police have in that particular area. At the start of every year, figures will be issued to the community, via the Community Council, relating to convictions and crime trends over the past year. The police are very keen to have community participation in this matter and will be looking to the Community Council for local feed back, so please contact you local representatives if you have any concerns.

#### WATER IMPROVEMENTS


The North of Scotland Water Authority has been working hard over the last few months to establish the correct chlorine levels in our water supply. Mike Dunlop, the Inverness Operation Unit engineer, told our reporter that regular weekly samples were being taken at random from households throughout the area. It is hoped that by monitoring the levels of chlorine the Water Authority can establish an acceptable level for customers whilst keeping within the EC directives. There is an inevitable time lag between the addition of the chlorine at the plant to the time that the customer fills their kettle. These teething problems as Mr Dunlop sees it, are slowly being reduced. It was also explained that lime is being added in small quantities to bring the acidic level of the water up to neutral. As to the rather "bland" taste which some of us have been experiencing, it is possible that in future years a different filtering material will be introduced to improve the taste of the water. #### TAKING A LEAD

Stratherrick School is giving the community a lead by making plans to mark the millennium. Head teacher Valerie Weir hopes the school can undertake the development of the school grounds. Though plans are still in the early stages of estimating the cost and seeking possible funding, a start has been made to a project that will be to the benefit of pupils long after the millennium has come and gone.

### PHOTOCOPIER IN THE STRATH

At the end of 1998 the Community Council, with the assistance of Highland Council were able to purchase a photocopier for the use of the community. It is a card operated system with cards being available from Lorraine Fraser Tel No 486 427. (The cost per copy 5p.) Cards are in denominations of 1000 copies. ### LAND REFORM - ONE OF ONLY THREE TO RESPOND

Stratherrick Community Council was one of only three Community Councils in Scotland to respond to the first Scottish Office Consultation Paper on Land Reform in Scotland. Land Reform will be one of the first issues that the new Scottish Parliament will be addressing. The first consultation paper concerned itself with identifying the problems and opportunities associated with Land Reform in Scotland. The results of this first paper can be seen in a second consultation paper published in September, which tries to identify the solutions associated with those problems and opportunities. Responses to this second paper were required by the end of November 1998.

Anyone wishing to see either of these papers should contact John Joyce, Secretary of the Community Council. Many different consultation papers are presented to community councils each year. Some are of more importance to the area than others and Land Reform is an important issue locally. Not all consultation papers can be tackled due to lack of time, manpower or sometimes insufficient knowledge of the subject. The Community Council, if time scales permit, will be using the pages of the BB to inform the community of any consultation papers which they receive, in the hope that anyone who might be willing to assist in any response will come forward.



# LOOKING BACK ON A LONG ASSOCIATION

Although I was not born in Stratherrick I first got to know and love it in 1927. My uncle, Stanley Gordon Clark, was the shooting tenant of Wester Aberchalder Lodge for many years. It belonged, with much of the surrounding land to the British Aluminium Company. Sadly, the house was burnt down at a later date.

There were few modern comforts in the house. We went to bed, each with our candle. Electricity was supplied by a generator in the annexe. This was unreliable and was switched off at 8p.m. each night. No electric fires or blankets! The B.A. was a flourishing company at that time, the houses at Foyers all occupied by employees, lovely gardens on a slope to the road and there was always a Flower Show in the summer. Dr Gamble was our doctor.

I didn't visit Gorthleck again until 1941. By then I had married and we had two children. We, in the South of England were living in the constant fear of invasion by the Germans. Many of our friends sent their children to safety in Canada. When my aunt, who was at Wester Aberchalder at the time, offered to have them, we accepted and they went from us, for how long we couldn't bear to think.

I remember well driving to Bletchley to put them on the Inverness night train as London was being bombed. I went along country roads with no sign posts. All these had been removed for the fear of invasion. Our son went to his first school at Errogie. Under the command of Miss MacGillivray, he has later admitted there was more discipline there than he ever came across in later years!

We came to Farraline in 1957 and have spent the happiest days of our life. So little in Stratherrick has changed though there are now more houses, the roads are better, and electricity is in every dwelling. I get visitors from many different parts of the world. This is a Fraser house and members of the clan come to see it. I also get visits from former evacuees who were sent here during the war. Some were happy, some ran away but they all remember the bitter cold of winter!

To end this contribution I would like to add that this is a wonderful community and I can't think of any other place where I can live so happily in my old age!

### PEOPLE NEW TO THE AREA COME FORWARD

A gratifying number of volunteers, all fairly new to the area, have come to the rescue of the village hall. There have not been enough members for a management committee. The sum needed to meet the required standards is well into the thousands of pounds and our fund raising has been at a standstill for the last year or so. We need one or two people to concentrate on that alone". It is hoped that extra volunteers will come forward before the next meeting in the hall on February 9th.


